A CONVERSATION WITH JOHN HALDANE

On Friday, 12 November, while most Melbournians (and thousands of others elsewhere) were following the memorable live screening of Bert Newton's funeral from St Patrick's Cathedral, across the road at MMHC a small group was experiencing a memorable and enjoyable experience of our own over morning tea with a delightful Scottish couple – Professor John Haldane and his wife, Hilda.

In general, our apartments usually provide short-term accommodation to our guests but John and Hilda have been here for some months while John is engaged at ACU nearby. As Professor of Philosophy of Education (one of his titles), John is leading an important educational, cultural and societal project in partnership with the Archdiocese of Melbourne and Catholic Education Melbourne.

A quick check on Google will give a breath-taking list of John's qualifications and achievements as philosopher, commentator, broadcaster and former papal adviser to the Vatican. His impressive CV in one paragraph includes the title of 'conversationalist'. What it doesn't say, however, is that both John and his wife Hilda are 'at home' with themselves, are delightfully unpretentious and are both great story-tellers. It was while sharing a good informal "Aussie" cuppa that we had the benefit of their wonderful Scottish/Glaswegian humour as they shared stories of their experiences around the world and their encounters with people from all walks of life including Popes, royalty and the renowned JK Rowlings of Harry Potter fame.



Needless to say, we all enjoyed the time together and were very grateful to John and Hilda for sharing it with us. Unfortunately, a good deal of their time in Melbourne has been spent in lockdown so hopefully, now that we have fewer restrictions, they will have opportunity to see something more of Melbourne and perhaps regional Victoria.

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HERITAGE PLAQUE INSTALLED

It is with much gratitude that I thank Sr Patricia for what she does behind the scenes, especially initiating and following up with local councils and other community organisations to keep MMHC on people's radar to ensure that the legacy of Mary and the SOSJ remains known.

In the photos above you will notice the blue plaque that adorns MMHCs heritage fence. Patricia led the process to obtain the plaque with Heritage Victoria. There is no rest for Patricia as she liaises now with City of Melbourne to have Wayfinding signage that leads to the Mary MacKillop Heritage Centre! Thank you Patricia for helping me learn the dates when different names were used for the building:

1902 – St Joseph's Providence

1920 - St Joseph's Hostel

1997 – MacKillop House (as the Hostel had closed in 1996)

2007 - Mary MacKillop Heritage Centre.

The plaque was installed on the day that Rev. Dr Max Vodola, priest of All Saints' Parish, Fitzroy visited. Max will be celebrating Mass in honour of Mary MacKillop's birthday on Sunday 16 January at 10am followed by morning tea in the parish hall, to honour Mary's life and legacy and pray for the ongoing work of the Josephite Sisters. You may also be interested in reading about the birthday of St Mary MacKillop on 15 January, by Sr Joan Healy as she reflects on the life and times of Australia's first saint.

DID YOU KNOW? Mary MacKillop had a radical vision of the way the Order of the Sisters should be structured – she didn't want the Order to be subject to direction by the Bishops of particular dioceses, and every Sister was to help with the work, regardless of background.



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MARY MACKILLOP RESPONDS TO THE PANDEMIC BY CREATING AN OUTDOOR CLASSROOM

COVID created its challenges and interestingly many opportunities about rethinking how organisations operate. At MMHC COVID density limitations impacted on the delivery of MMHC programs due to the number of people that could be in a Museum room at any one time. This had significant impact especially on our school class group sizes.

Kate our administration person, with that warm, welcoming, inclusive disposition that visitors find on arrival to the Centre, convened a working group to capture ideas for an alternative functional area and teaching space. We wanted the space to be interactive with the aim to engage classes using images; value adding to the teachability of the space. The group came up with the idea of creating a space that had a mural, turf mats and moveable dividers made from shop pallets. It was identified to have the mural complement the focus on the Victorian story as reflected in the museum.

Kate led the development of this outdoor classroom and contributed significantly to the design of the beautiful mural that now adorns our visitors parking area. We thank Regina Byrne and Chris Sage from Hullaballoo Studios the artists who gifted their time and talents to bring our vision for the mural alive. We thank Regina and Chris for donating this contemporary large scale wall mural depicting the significant events in the life of Saint Mary's Victorian story; the mural is 4.8 m in length. The mural will now proudly be used in the years ahead as another 'vehicle' for telling the story of Mary MacKillop's work in Victoria.
