THE 'AUSSIE CAMINO'

Jim Phelan recently completed the 'Aussie Camino' and shares his experience with us. The day before the Aussie Camino began, the group travelled to Victoria and some of the group stayed at the Mary MacKillop Heritage Centre in East Melbourne. The entire group then met at the Heritage Centre and were given an initial insight into the life and work of St Mary MacKillop. "One of the best things about doing the walk and completing Camino's overseas is that it's not just a walk – many people 'find themselves' while participating. There can be a lot of soul-searching and opportunity to reflect. One of the pilgrims completed the Aussie Camino for charity. The pilgrim raised \$10,000 for Interplast, a non-government organisation that sends teams of volunteer plastic reconstructive surgeons, anaesthetists, nurses and allied health professionals to provide life-changing surgery and medical training across the Asia Pacific region.



(Also known as the "Poor School" or the "Syrian School" and was located in the street behind the first Providence in Latrobe Street).









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ARTIST WENDY BLACK VISITS

On Friday the 24th of June during the Feast of the Sacred Heart, the Mary MacKillop Heritage Centre welcomed artist Wendy Black, whose artwork forms part of the Mary MacKillop Museum collection. Wendy is a highly accomplished artist who recently celebrated her 50-year retrospective art exhibition. Wendy has been a finalist in portrait and landscape art competitions within Australia, and had artwork selected for the National Gallery of Australia's book on printmaking, Printed: Images by Australian Artists 1942 -2020.

Wendy painted "Mary MacKillop in Rome" for the Mary MacKillop art awards for the celebration of the Beatification of Mary MacKillop in 1995; organised by the Sisters of Saint Joseph. Although the painting was not selected for the prize, the Mary MacKillop Museum was fortunate to receive it as a donation in 2007 following many loved years residing with one of Wendy's in-laws.

The artwork was created using acrylic paints on canvas and is 60cm x 91cm in size. It was one in a series of piazza paintings that Wendy created between 1994-1996, inspired by her visit to Rome. Wendy's Mary is situated in the colonnade of San Pietro, with the artist intending to capture a pivotal moment in Mary's life when she had to go to Rome to speak on behalf of those she represented and cared for.

The staff at Mary MacKillop Museum are grateful for Wendy's visit; which provided great insight into the artwork. The piece in question is currently displayed in the Director's office at the Heritage Centre, with future plans for it to be placed in the museum on display to the public.

THE RUG ON MARY'S CHAIR

During preparatory work for the Museum, one of our advisors suggested a homemade rug could be placed over the arm of Mary MacKillop's chair. The rug was made by Sr. Betty O'Donnell in 2005. She researched early handwork in the Australian colony to identify the appropriate colours and type of wool this rug required to be 'authentic' to the period. Knitted rugs were apparently made in preference to crochet at this time. Garter stitch dominated images of handmade garments. Pastel colours were not readily available but rather only natural tones made from plants and rocks. The wool for this rug came from the Bendigo Woollen Mills.
